

Missoula County Dislocated Worker Resources - Wood Products Industry

Dislocated workers encompass individuals who have been laid off or terminated and deemed eligible for unemployment benefits, as well as those who have received notice of termination or layoff due to a permanent business closure or downsizing.

#1 Resource: Missoula Job Service

The primary resource for dislocated workers in Missoula County is the Missoula Job Service Center. The staff at Missoula Job Service can assist in navigating unemployment and training benefits, support the job search process, and facilitate access to local training programs.

Immediate Actions

After a job loss, it is normal to feel a bit lost and anxious. But Job Service Montana can help you identify your next steps to get a solid headstart on the next phase of your life and career.

Talk to your employer about:

Insurance Benefits

- If you have job-based health insurance, check if your plan will extend coverage for a certain period.
- Ask about COBRA coverage, which could allow you to maintain your insurance coverage after leaving your job.

First, File Your Unemployment Insurance (UI) Claim

Unemployment Insurance benefits are meant to help laid-off workers stay financially stable while seeking re-employment. Here's what to know about filing your claim.

Ways to File your UI Claim

- Go to montanaworks.gov to sign up for an account
- Or call 406-444-2545 to file a claim by phone.

Important Information to Have on Hand:

- Your Social Security number, or Alien Registration number for non-US Citizens
- Name, address, and dates of employment for any job you've worked in the past 18 months
- You will need a bank routing number and account number for direct deposit of benefits

Important!

Keep working for your current employer until the actual layoff occurs.

Quitting earlier may affect your eligibility for UI benefits, training programs, and other resources

Ask for a Layoff Letter

- Ask your HR department for a layoff letter, which should include information about the nature of your job loss.
- This proof that getting laid off was out of your control will be needed as documentation for potential training benefits.



Identity Verification

- For your protection and to reduce fraudulent claims, you will be asked to confirm your identity using ID.Me when you first file a claim.
- Job Service Montana or Montana UI (406-444-2545) can help you complete this essential part of the UI Claim process.

Important Things to Know About the UI Process



- Filing a claim is not the same as requesting payment. Once your claim is filed, you must request payments to receive your UI benefits.
- You must sign a Claimant Agreement.
- The **Montana UI Claimant's Handbook** has all the information you will need to successfully file your claim—scan the **QR code** on the left to get the Handbook.

Refresh Your Resume...

- **Tailor it to the position** The qualifications listed in a job description let you know what a company or hiring manager is looking for. Use keywords from the job posting to highlight your most relevant skills and experience.
- **Be concise** Avoid putting too many details in your resume. Hiring managers tend to receive multiple resumes at once, so avoid redundancy.
- **Keep it professional** Typically, hiring managers and recruiters contact prospective job applicants via email. Listing a professional email address on your resume is extremely important.
- **Don't forget a cover letter** When sending a resume (especially online), don't forget to include a cover letter.
- Always proofread Before submitting your cover letter and resume, review
 it for possible errors. You can also ask a friend or loved one to check for
 spelling, grammar, or punctuation mistakes.
